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State Awards Public Schools \$6 Million for Emergency Repairs

Each year, the SAB is allocated monies from the general fund to reimburse schools for emergency repairs made to school facilities. The 30 schools in seven districts required repairs such as new paving, heating and ventilation systems, roofing, and fire detection systems.

“In this tough fiscal climate, I’m pleased that the State Allocation Board can continue to help schools make the necessary repairs to ensure our kids are learning in safe classrooms,” said Tom Sheehy, who represents Department of Finance Director as State Allocation Board Chair.

In related school construction news last month, the SAB has released nearly \$548 million to schools for construction projects that had been approved for funding, but were unable to receive funds due to the freeze placed on disbursements from the Pooled Money Investment Board in December. In the coming weeks, SAB will release \$1.4 billion in Build America Bonds funding that was made available last month for halted construction projects.

The State Allocation Board (SAB) is responsible for determining the allocation of voter-approved school construction bonds, as well as the administration of the School Facility Program, the State Relocatable Classroom Program, and the Deferred Maintenance Program. The SAB is the policy level body for the programs administered by the Office of Public School Construction.
