In reviewing the proposed changes to Building Standards Code, Section 3120B, I have a comment that applies not only to the changes being made but to the entire section. In paragraph 3120B.1 General, it states that, "All signs shall have clearly legible letters or numbers not less than 4 inches high, unless otherwise specified." My enquiry about this is not the actual dimensions but the vagueness of the intent and application. Does this apply only to the signs and text required by the code for public safety purposes or does it apply to any signs that are to be posted at public pools. Case in point is the 3120B.2 Pool User Capacity sign. Technically I could create a sign that only says, "MAX POOL 32, SPA 6", all in 4 inch text, when saying, "Maximum Capacity of Users Allowed: Pool 32, Spa 6" would be more to the benefit of the public. But would I have to put all that text at 4" height and make the sign much larger and costly? I would like to suggest that all signage requirements be described in more detail, like the 3120B.4 No Lifeguard Sign section. This would clarify requirements and make violations easier to spot, and improve the products meant to supply the sign market for pools and public safety. Respectfully.
